The Siberian Taiga is the largest forest in the world, often referred to as the "lungs of the Earth."




Siberia is home to mysterious craters, such as the Patomskiy Crater, which scientists are still studying.



Siberia is home to diverse wildlife, including Siberian tigers, leopards, bears, and the unique Baikal seal.




Well-preserved woolly mammoth remains have been found in the Siberian permafrost.
